## Lesson 11 Vocabulary List

**<u>diagram</u>**: *n*. A plan or drawing that shows how something works or how different parts fit together. (*Example: Ahmad quickly made a <u>diagram</u> of the stockroom showing us where he wanted each box placed.*)

**<u>frustrate</u>**: *v*. To keep from carrying out a plan or reaching a goal. (*Example: The foul weather today <u>frustrated</u> our plan to visit the zoo.)* 

**<u>frustrating</u>**: *adj.* Causing one to be upset or discouraged. (*Example: Seeing his favorite ball on the dresser just out of reach was very <u>frustrating</u> to Yves.)* 

**graduate**: *n*. A person who has finished a course of study. (*Example: The graduates proudly walked up on stage to receive their diploma.*)

*v*. To finish a course of study and receive a diploma. (*Example: After Sarah graduated from high school, she worked for a year to save money for college.*)

**prank**: *n*. A playful trick or joke. (*Example: For a <u>prank</u>, Melanie put a rubber snake in Mr. Donne's desk drawer.*)

**primary** *adj*. 1. First in importance. (*Example: After the fire, the family's primary need was a place to stay.*)

2. First in order. (*Example: When we finish primary school, we will go on to the middle school.*)

<u>**risk**</u>: *v*. To take a chance on being hurt or losing something. (*Example: You <u>risk</u>* being thrown from the car in an accident if you do not wear a seat belt.)

*n*. The chance of getting hurt or suffering loss or failure. (*Example: We put* on sunscreen to lower the <u>risk</u> of skin cancer.)

**<u>risky</u>**: *adj*. Likely to cause harm or damage; dangerous. (*Example: Mike did not think it was* <u>*risky*</u> *to ride a bike without a helmet until he fell off and bumped his head.*)

**<u>stress</u>**: *v*. To pay special attention to. (*Example: The dentist <u>stressed</u> the importance of brushing our teeth daily to keep them healthy.*)

*n*. 1. A strain or pressure put on a person or thing. (*Example: Although* Renee enjoys being on the swim team, she also feels <u>stress</u> before each race.)

2. Special force put on a word or part of a word. (*Example: When you say* "cocoon," you place the <u>stress</u> on the second part of the word.)

**urge**: *v*. To speak strongly for something; to argue in favor of something. (*Example: Because we had liked the play at the children's theater so much, we urged our cousins to see it.*)

*n*. A strong feeling of wanting to do something; a strong wish. (*Example: Annabel felt an* <u>urge</u> *to walk straight through the mud puddle in her good shoes.*)

**vacant**: *adj*. Having nothing or no one in it; not filled; empty. (Example: As the children explored the second floor of the old castle, they found room after room completely vacant.)

**vigorous**: *adj*. Demanding strength or energy; very active. (*Example: My grandparents enjoyed their vigorous hike in the White Mountains.*)
