## Lesson 2 Vocabulary List

<u>attract</u>: v. To bring or draw closer. (*Example: The large red flowers <u>attracted</u> all kinds of birds.*)

<u>attractive</u>: *adj.* Pleasing to the eye or mind. (*Example: The bakery window, filled* with pies, cakes, and cookies was so <u>attractive</u> that I wanted to go in.)

**<u>attraction</u>**: *n*. Something that draws attention (Example: One <u>attraction</u> Karen attends every September is the state fair.)

**<u>crew</u>**: *n*. A group of people working together, especially one that runs an airplane or large vessel. (*Example: The <u>crew</u> worked quickly to take down the sails on the boat.*)

**<u>dangle</u>**: *v*. To hang loosely. (*Example: Not yet ready to go in the pool, Ramona sat by the edge and <u>dangled</u> her feet in the water.)* 

<u>drift</u>: *n*. A pile of sand or snow created by moving air or water. (*Example: The* <u>drifts</u> of snow in the driveway mean that we will need to shovel.)

*v*. To be carried along by moving air or water. (*Example: Liz climbed onto the raft and let herself <u>drift</u> along the river for a while.)* 

**<u>event</u>**: *n*. Something that happens, especially something important. (Example: The big <u>event</u> of the week for Sharon was going to see Swan Lake with her mom.)

**<u>launch</u>**: *n*. An open motorboat that is used for short distance. (Example: The <u>*launch*</u> carried our class across the river for a picnic.)

*v*. 1. To put a boat or vessel in the water. (*Example: Bob <u>launched</u> the canoe onto the pond and started to paddle to the other side.*) 2. To get started or to make a move. (*Example: Mr. Miller <u>launched</u> the clean-up day by giving everyone a pari of work gloves.*)

**opposite**: *adj*. 1. Very different from. (*Example: It is difficult to believe Ruth and Emily are sisters because they are <u>opposites</u> in so many ways.) 2. Facing or moving away from each other. (<i>Example: After they got off the bus, George and Sally said good-bye and walked off in <u>opposite</u> directions.)* 

<u>**reverse**</u>: v. To go backward or in the direction one just came from. (*Example: We laughed when Daniel suddenly <u>reversed</u> direction by walking backwards.)* 

*n*. Back to front. (*Example: One side of this coin shows a head and the* <u>reverse</u> side shows a building.)

**signal**: *n*. An object, action, or sound that gives a message or a warning. (*Example:* Seeing the flashing red <u>signal</u>, John told his brother they had to wait to cross the street.)

*v*. To do something that gives a message or warning. (*Example: Jeff <u>signaled</u> the start of the race by waving a flag.*)

**<u>steer</u>**: *n*. A young bull. (Example: The heard of thirsty <u>steers</u> gathered around the water tank.)

*v*. To steer is to guide the direction of. (*Example: Bonnie carefully* <u>steered</u> *her bicycle around her brother's toys.*)
