Lesson 9 Vocabulary List

<u>attitude:</u> *n*. A way of thinking or feeling about certain things. (Example: Complaining and grouchy before lunch, Tina had quite a different <u>attitude</u> *after she had eaten something.)*

<u>confess</u>: v. To say or admit that one has done something wrong. (*Example:* When my older sister accused me of getting spots on her best sweater, I <u>confessed</u> that I had, but by accident.)

<u>defend</u>: v. 1. To keep from being attacked; to protect. (*Example: The mother* goose <u>defended</u> her young by beating her wings up and down as she ran toward us hissing.)

2. To speak for; to argue in favor of. (*Example: My cousin* <u>defended</u> me when my brother complained that I never helped with the dishes.)

gradual: *adj*. Happening slowly; taking place little by little. (*Example: The rising sea level is caused by the gradual melting of the ice cap in Antarctica.*)

<u>hint</u>: *n*. Information given to help someone to answer a question; a clue. (*Example: Mr. Wang said he would not give us any <u>hints</u> until we had tried to solve the puzzle.)*

v. To suggest something without saying directly what one means. *(Example: Rosa had <u>hinted</u> so often about receiving a puppy for her birthday that her parents felt they could not disappoint her.)*

individual: *n*. A single person, apart from others in a group. (Example: When the teacher asked everyone in class who knew the answer to stand, only one <u>individual</u> stood.)

adj. Meant for just one. (*Example: At the kennel, all the animals* were kept in <u>individual</u> cages.)

<u>malice</u>: *n*. The wish to hurt others on purpose. (*Example: Although Camilla felt no <u>malice</u> toward whoever stole her wallet, she was going to be angry if it was not returned.*)

malicious: *adj*. Done with a wish to harm or cause pain. (*Example: Everyone agreed that spray painting words on the side of the new store was a malicious thing to do.*)

<u>misery</u>: *n*. A feeling of great unhappiness. (*Example: The flash flood brought* <u>*misery*</u> *to hundreds of families whose homes were now standing in four feet of water.*)

<u>miserable</u>: *adj.* 1. Very unhappy or unpleasant. (*Example: The mosquitoes* were so thick in the woods that I was <u>miserable for the entire hike</u>.)

2.Very bad; of poor quality. (*Example: We discovered what a* <u>miserable</u> job the roofer had done when we found a leak in the attic after the next rainstorm.)

solution: *n*. 1. The answer to a problem or puzzle. (*Example: After filling in all but a few of the blanks in the crossword puzzle, Rico turned to the back of the newspaper for the solution*.)

2. A mixture formed when a liquid and some other stuff are mixed together. (*Example: Brine, which is a solution of salt and water, keeps pickles crisp and fresh.*)

<u>survey</u>: *v*. To look over; to examine. (*Example: From a helicopter, the governor* <u>*surveyed*</u> *the damage caused by the tornado.*)

n. A study designed to gather information about a subject. (*Example: Our class made a survey of all students to find out which lunches were most popular.*)
