Vocabulary Review Week Lessons 1-10

dangle: *v*. To hang loosely. (*Example: Not yet ready to go in the pool, Ramona sat by the edge and <u>dangled</u> her feet in the water.)*

<u>marsh</u>: *n*. A low-lying area, often covered with tall grasses, where the ground is soft and wet. (Example: The <u>marshes</u> near Long Island Sound provide a home for many snails, crabs, and minnows.)

<u>marshy</u>: *adj.* Soft and moist underfoot. (*Example: Reeds and cattails grow in the marshy area near the lake.*)

<u>defend</u>: *v*. 1. To keep from being attacked; to protect. (*Example: The mother goose* <u>*defended*</u> *her young by beating her wings up and down as she ran toward us hissing.*)

2. To speak for; to argue in favor of. (*Example: My cousin <u>defended</u> me when my brother complained that I never helped with the dishes.*)

rely: *v*. To count on; to look to for support. (*Example: When they asked Diane if they could <u>rely</u> on her to deliver the secret message to the right person, she said, "Of course!")*

<u>reliable</u>: *adj*. Trustworthy; not likely to fail. (*Example: Until he could repair the brakes, Dad said our car was not <u>reliable</u> for a trip from Houston to Minneapolis.)*

<u>continent</u>: *n*. One of the seven great land areas of the world. (*Example: There are seven <u>continents</u> on planet earth.*)

<u>span</u>: *n*. 1. The distance or a section between two objects or supports. (Example: The bridge at Cape Giradeau, Missouri, has three <u>spans</u>.)

2. A period or length of time. (*Example: With a span of seventeen years, the cicada is probably the longest-living insect.*)

v. To stretch from one side to the other. (*Example: The Harahan Bridge* <u>spans</u> the Mississippi River between Tennessee and Arkansas.)

landmark: *n*. 1. A building or natural feature that is easy to see and can be used as a guide. (*Example: The Gateway Arch is a well-known landmark in St. Louis, Missouri.*)

2. An important event. (*Example: The discovery that certain bacteria can cause disease was a landmark in the history of medicine.*)

<u>structure</u>: *n*. Something that is build, as a building or bridge. (*Example: From the road, it was easy to see that the largest <u>structure</u> in town was the hundred-food water tower.)*

freight: *n*. Goods carried from place to place, as by plane, boat, truck, or train. (*Example: The trains passing through this station carry <u>freight from the middle of the country to the East Coast.</u>)*

<u>enable</u>: *v*. To make possible; to give the means to bring about. (Example: Living for a year in Greece <u>enabled</u> everyone in my family to learn to speak some Greek.)

<u>additional</u>: *adj.* Added or extra. (*Example: Andrew brought an <u>additional</u> bottle of water to the tennis court.*)

<u>method</u>: *n*. A way of doing something. (Example: Tara's <u>method</u> for bringing her cat inside is to shake the container with treats.)
