Review Week #6 Vocabulary List

primary *adj*. 1. First in importance. (*Example: After the fire, the family's primary need was a place to stay.*)

2. First in order. (*Example: When we finish primary school, we will go on to the middle school.*)

<u>convey</u>: *v*. 1. To carry or move from one place to another. (*Example: A wagon with high sides conveyed the cut sugar-cane to the mill.*)

2. To make an idea or feeling known. (*Example: As the curtain closed, the crowd clapped loudly to <u>convey</u> how much they had enjoyed the play.)*

<u>regret</u>: *v*. To feel sorry for something. (*Example: My brother <u>regrets</u> that he left his bicycle out in the rain because now the seat is soaked.*)

n. A feeling of sadness or of being sorry. *(Example: Dana's one <u>regret</u> was that she did not visit her grandparents this summer.)*

grasp: *v*. 1. To take hold of something tightly with the hands. (*Example: Tina grasped* the bars on the gym set and pulled herself up.)

2. To understand something. (*Example: After we grasped the directions, it was easy to do the puzzle.*)

<u>malice</u>: *n*. The wish to hurt others on purpose. (*Example: Although Camilla felt no* <u>malice</u> toward whoever stole her wallet, she was going to be angry if it was not returned.) **malicious**: *adj*. Done with a wish to harm or cause pain. (*Example: Everyone agreed that spray painting words on the side of the new store was a <u>malicious</u> <i>thing to do.*)

ordeal: n. An unpleasant, painful, or difficult experience or test. (Example: Lena's visit to the dentist was not the <u>ordeal</u> she had feared it would be.)

<u>misery</u>: *n*. A feeling of great unhappiness. (*Example: The flash flood brought* <u>misery</u> to hundreds of families whose homes were now standing in four feet of water.)

miserable: *adj.* 1. Very unhappy or unpleasant. (*Example: The mosquitoes were so thick in the woods that I was <u>miserable</u> for the entire hike.)*

2. Very bad; of poor quality. (*Example: We discovered what a <u>miserable</u> job the roofer had done when we found a leak in the attic after the next rainstorm.*)

series: *n*. A number of similar things laid out or happening in a certain order. (*Example: This summer, the <u>series</u> of evening concerts by the river includes one of my favorite guitar players.*)

<u>**risk**</u>: *v*. To take a chance on being hurt or losing something. (*Example: You <u>risk</u>* being thrown from the car in an accident if you do not wear a seat belt.)

n. The chance of getting hurt or suffering loss or failure. (*Example: We put* on sunscreen to lower the <u>risk</u> of skin cancer.)

<u>risky</u>: *adj*. Likely to cause harm or damage; dangerous. (*Example: Mike did not think it was <u>risky</u> <i>to ride a bike without a helmet until he fell off and bumped his head.*)

<u>attitude</u>: *n*. A way of thinking or feeling about certain things. (Example: Complaining and grouchy before lunch, Tina had quite a different <u>attitude</u> after she had eaten something.)

version: *n*. A story or account of something that may differ from other accounts of the same event. (*Example: Trying to find out how the accident happened was not easy because the three people who saw it each gave a different <u>version</u> of what took place.)*

gulf: *n*. 1. A large area of a sea or ocean that is partly enclosed by land. (*Example: The* <u>*Gulf*</u> *of Mexico is bordered to the north and south by the United States and to the west and south by Mexico*.)

2. A great distance between. (*Example: After their argument, Sharin felt that a gulf had opened between her and her friend.*)
